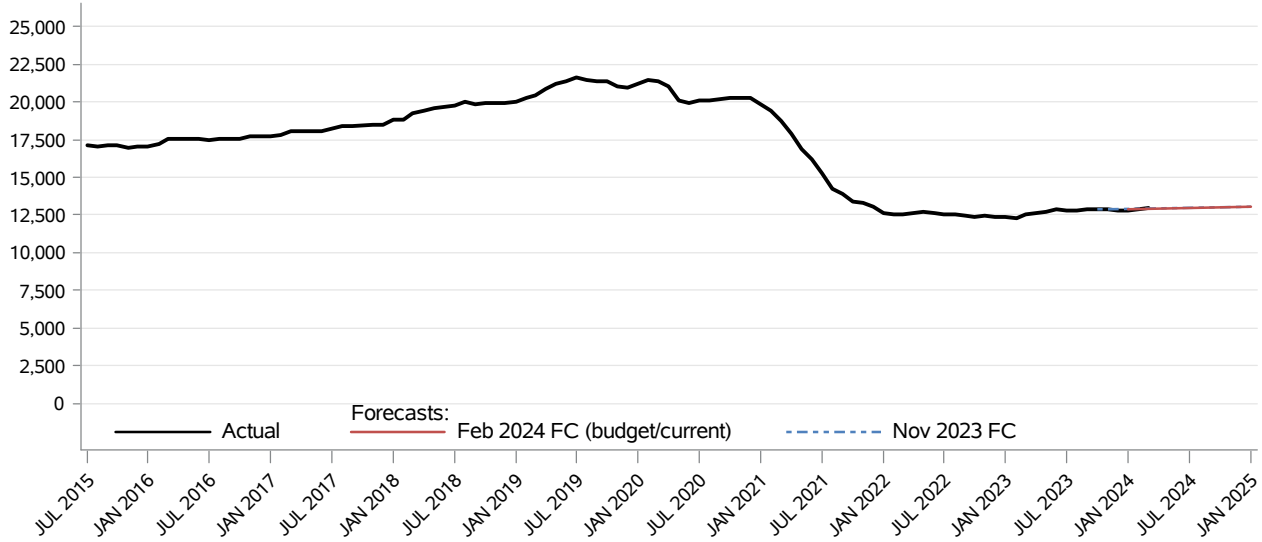


Corrections Community Supervision Contact Required

CFC Monthly Monitoring Report

The Adult Community Supervision Contact Required caseload forecast includes adults in the community who have been convicted of a crime, and who are actively supervised by the Department of Corrections, and have requirements to maintain contact with department staff, usually on a monthly basis.

- **Current Forecast:** Most recent forecast adopted by the Caseload Forecast Council; may be the same as the Budget Forecast.
